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# President's Letter



Dear Students, Alumni and Donors,

About a year ago in our GCS Summer Newsletter these are the last words I wrote to you: "My prayer for you all is that no matter

what challenges we may face in the coming days, that the truth and reality of what God accomplished for us in the life, crucifixion, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ that we celebrate on Easter Sunday does not fade away. But we'd find the Risen Lord by his Spirit accompanying us every day of the year, shedding light and renewing life each step of our way—in hope of his final renewal of all things."

Little did we know then what we, and even the whole world, would be facing now. Given world history, our circumstances are not entirely unprecedented but still unexpected and seriously disruptive. And for some, when the Covid-19 virus contributed to the death of a loved one, it has been particularly grievous. In the midst of upheaval and uncertainty perhaps you, like I, felt a deeper appreciation for our hope in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ and our one day sharing in it.

The "death of death in the death of Jesus Christ" (as one theologian has put it) and the inbreaking into our time and space of regenerated life through the resurrection of Jesus means there is real, actual hope. Jesus Christ, Lord of the universe, is not stymied by our pandemic and knows how to weave into his good purposes all of what the world is going through (Rom. 8:26-33). As the Scottish pastor and author, George MacDonald put it, "The Son of God suffered unto death, not that

men might not suffer but that their sufferings might be like his." That is, even our sufferings are being redeemed.

Our gracious Triune God has not allowed anything to happen that he cannot completely redeem in the end. And those who love him and his purposes will recognize and find great joy in that fact. That is our hope in Jesus Christ, the one who endured the cross "for the joy set before him" (Heb. 12:2).

Christian hope directs us to the future, but it is also to infuse how we live every day. We live in fellowship and communion with the Lord of that future, who accompanies us every day. In that way, our current situation is not all that different from any day, every day. We live as those who have real hope, even in times of trials. It turns out that having a true hope in Jesus Christ for all that he has done, is doing and will do enables us to contribute some "earthly good" here and now. Hope in Christ enables us to have and share the peace of Christ with those tempted to panic and become anxious. I know many of you have had special opportunities to share that hope and offer practical help with others in the last few weeks.

So, in communion with our risen Lord, we seek guidance and grace for each day. It's his grace that "normalizes" every day, providing us the North Star by which we can navigate through times of calm and storm.

And all this is no less true of us serving in GCS. So, let me share with you some of the more mundane news of the seminary. The daily operations of GCS have continued fairly smoothly over these past few months.

Our November and December was punctuated by the demands of producing hundreds of pages of reports and documentation required from us to apply for the renewal of our accreditation from the **Distance Education Accreditation** Commission for the next five years. A team of five traveled to our Charlotte offices to spend the day interviewing us. (They were impressed with the facility!) The visit went well thanks to the competent and diligent preparatory work and professional presentations of the GCS staff, Mike Morrison, Georgia McKinnon, Lance McKinnon and Russell Duke. We are now making a reply to followup questions from the team. The final word will come to us from the Commission sometime in early July.

We have also made application to offer a third degree, the Master's of Divinity. This is a three-year degree in comparison to the two others we offer, which are two-year degrees. It more extensively integrates pastoral training with the foundational biblical, historical, theological and pastoral studies offered in our current programs. The accreditors are now evaluating the design of the program and the courses involved in it. We hope to hear on this matter in the next month or two. We'll let you know if and when we can begin to offer this advanced degree.

More up to the moment, we have wrapped up the Spring term and are gearing up for the Summer term. Be sure to take a look at the courses we are offering. We have a good, strong line-up. Our ever ready, able, and now experienced Registrar, Georgia McKinnon, will be awaiting your application and any questions you may have.

One of the things I'm particularly grateful for is that our faculty are already experienced to teach online courses which have been designed from scratch to be offered in just that format. So the pandemic has not been nearly as disruptive for us as for others of our colleagues and schools who serve in the traditional classroom context.



The positive side is that it along with the conference has been postponed until 2021 at about the same time of year and by that time we will have even more graduates to celebrate! So, we can all look forward to that.

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# **Update by Liaison Officer**



GCS staff hosted the visiting team from the Distance Education Accrediting Commission on January 31st. This was the standard visit by

DEAC colleagues that comes every five years to evaluate how well each institution meets the twelve DEAC Standards. After several months of preparing our document, we submitted our Self Evaluation Report early in December. We also responded to the external DEAC review of our

academic programs for the visit.

The visit went well. The evaluators interviewed President Gary Deddo, Chair Joseph Tkach and board members, Dean Michael Morrison, Registrar Georgia McKinnon and Assistant Liaison Officer Lance McKinnon, CFO Mat Morgan, Robert Meade, Bret Miller, and GCI President Greg Williams, and several students, board members and faculty in a telephone hookup. It was a long but successful day.

The Chair's report from the DEAC visit came back to us at the end of February, and it held no big surprises. We have responded to required actions and await the Commission decision in their June meeting which will be communicated in early July. We pray that we are granted another five-year term of accredited status. Please pray with us that we will not have any undue financial or academic issues to address further.

# **Update by Dean of Faculty**



Where are we in the re-accreditation process? We are now waiting. A committee from our accrediting agency visited us on January

31. We received their report in late March. They said that we need to make a few changes in our strategic plan, our faculty policies, and the enrollment agreement. We made these changes and submitted supporting documentation to the agency in mid

April. The accrediting commission meets in June, and will announce their decision in early July.

Our application to be able to offer a Master of Divinity degree is also being considered. We submitted a description of the program; following normal procedures, they asked for more details about four courses in the program, and they are now considering whether our program meets generally accepted standards for this degree. As reported in the spring issue of *GCS News*, we were given permission to offer courses in a hybrid format, with part of the course being online and part with face-to-face meetings. Due to travel and meeting restrictions, we will not be offering hybrid courses this year, but we hope to be able to offer them next year.
